COLLEGE PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome back to the 2018 school year. As always it has been a busy start with new staff and many new enrolments. A particular warm welcome to families whose child/children are attending for the first time at the college.

Apart from our priority of delivering the highest quality teaching and learning programs to our students we are focusing on Engaging with Community over the next 2 years. During 2017 we worked with a project team from the DoE to ascertain data in relation to where GLC sat as an educational institution in our local area. The team visited our feeder primary schools and interviewed parents and teachers in regard to their perceptions of the college, surveyed the GLC P&C, analysed our communication with the wider community through newsletters, letters sent home, front office communications and local media stories. We were given the results in the last weeks of the school term late last year. In general the College is held in very high regard in what we do for our students. SEVEN NEW SCHOOL ZONE TRAFFIC OFFENCES

To help schools keep the school zone safer for all pedestrians and drivers there are seven new traffic infringements with new fines. None of the seven offences attract demerit points when committed elsewhere on the road but in a school zone they each come with two points. The changes are:

- 1. Stopping in intersection—Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- 2. Stop within 20m of intersection (traffic lights) Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- 3. Stop within 10m of intersection (no traffic lights) Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- 4. Stop near bicycle crossing lights—Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$439 and 2 demerit points.
- 5. Obstruct access to ramp/path/passageway—Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a penalty of \$330 and 2 demerit points.
- 6. Not parallel park in the direction of travel—Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.
- 7. Parallel park close to dividing line—Under the changes if a driver commits this offence in a school zone they will receive a \$330 fine and 2 demerit points.

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

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DEPUTY PRINCIPALS' REPORT

A nervous, anxious and excited Year 7 began their secondary education at Forster Campus on Thursday January 28. By the end of the day they were old hands at navigating their way around the place. It is pleasing to report that all seem settled and smiling faces greet us in the playground. Japanese seems to be a hit, with Science a close second.

Class Structures 2018

The school takes class placements very seriously and we spend a lot of time ensuring student placements are made in a fair and objective manner.

At the end of each semester, results are moderated across the core subjects (English, Mathematics, Science, HSIE and PDHPE). This ranking provides the basis for class placements. Head Teachers meet to discuss placements and address any anomalies (e.g. a student whose marks, because of recent enrolment or extended illness, do not reflect their true ability.)

Year 10 Class Structure

Year 10 has been divided into Red and White lines. These lines were constructed by ranking students according to their performance in English, Mathematics, Science, History/Geography and PDHPE. Students were then distributed equally between the Red and White lines. There are 3 classes in each line. Each faculty determines class placements for students. Elective classes run separately and are chosen to satisfy the greatest number of students.

Year 9 Class Structure

Year 9 has 5 classes on one line for English, Mathematics, Science, History/Geography and PDHPE. Each faculty places students in classes. Elective classes run separately and are chosen to satisfy the greatest number of students.

Year 8 Class Structure

Students are placed in the same class for all core subjects. There is an OC class and 5 mixed ability classes. Placement in the OC class is based on the student's overall mark and rank in Year 7 2017. Mixed ability classes are chosen with the aim of making each class as balanced as possible. Students are placed in different, smaller classes for Mandatory Technology and Visual Arts.

Students in Year 8 study an elective in each semester.

Year 7 Class Structure

mixed ability classes based on information from Primary schools, NAPLAN results and literacy and numeracy testing conducted late last year. We will conduct the CogAT (Cognitive Abilities) Test in Term 1, Week 4-22nd and 23^{rd} February, as a means to identify the strengths of our Year 7 students with a view to cater for additional programs. The *Cognitive Abilities Test* (CogAT) measures students' learned reasoning abilities in the three areas most linked to academic success in school: Verbal, Quantitative and Nonverbal. Reasoning abilities have substantial correlations with learning and problem solving, both within and outside of school. Results will be used to assist our Teaching and Learning Team to make more accurate student class placement decisions, as well as helping our teachers to expand instructional opportunities for all students.

Students are placed in the same class for all core subjects including Japanese and Music. At this stage there are 6

Students are placed in different, smaller classes for Mandatory Technology.

Reviewing Placements

Class placements are reviewed at the end of each term based on student results. Between reviews, the school is very reluctant to make changes to classes other than in exceptional circumstances.

It is worth remembering that, while we place students with the aim of maximising each student's learning outcomes, the most important factor in determining student achievement is each individual student's application to work and study, and the quality teaching provided in the classrooms at Forster Campus. Students can and do achieve outstanding results from any class.

NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2018 the following vaccines will be offered:

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- Read all the information provided
- Complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- Return the completed consent form to their child's school
- Ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that students who commence HPV vaccination in school clinics in Year 7 but do not complete the course during the school year may be offered catch-up doses at school in Year 8.

Students who have dose 1 HPV at their GP will be advised to complete the course with their GP.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at http://www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation/Pages/withdraw_consent.aspx

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic as a physical card. Parents/guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Hello everyone. I hope you all had a relaxing and enjoyable festive season.

The school year has started smoothly with all students, particularly Year 7 settling in well.

It has been a hectic start to the year, not only welcoming Year 7, but interviewing and enrolling 33 new students!! This has resulted in 513 students enrolled in mainstream and 31 students in the Support Unit, a total of 544, which is 11 more than anticipated.

We have a number of new staff joining us this year:

Mrs Vanessa Thompson has accepted the School Counsellor vacancy.

Mr Pelley is the Relieving Head Teacher CAPA while Mr Jensen is Relieving Deputy. Mr Pelley joins us from

Canobalis High School where he is the substantive Head Teacher CAPA.

Mr Waring is Relieving Head Teacher Science while Mr Sewell is on extended LSL.

Mr Muscat has accepted a position at District Office for the next three years.

Mrs Hammond is fulfilling the Head Teacher role until a decision is made about how we will fill it long term.

Mr Doyle has been employed as Mr Muscat's replacement for the term.

Miss Dorahy is in the CAPA faculty teaching Art and Photography

Mr Hudson will be in the PDHPE department replacing Mr Riley who has moved to Science, replacing Mr Ceccato.

Mr Nealon joins us from Taree High School replacing Mr Webber in TAS for the next 12 months.

Mr Webber has remained on the Senior Campus for another year.

Mr Ptezcik replaces Miss King and Ms Doust replaces Mrs Fealy.

Miss King has returned to Sydney and Mrs Fealy is teaching in the Senior Campus this year.

Miss Dunk has also returned part time from maternity leave.

On the Staff Development Day all staff in the College had an introduction to the requirement for pre-2004 staff and maintaining accreditation. Tuncurry Campus staff then participated in a workshops on PBL and the new School Plan and Child Protection.

This year we have changed the way the Alternative Learning Centre (ALC) and the Rock and Water program will function. ALC identified Year 10 students will be assisted by Mrs Crossman with assessment tasks for one period a day, rather than one day per week. The idea is that students will only need to attend when needed rather than missing whole days and lessons. Rock and Water will be delivered to identified Year 7 students once a week, rather than to a whole class during sport once a fortnight.

These programs along with Links to Learning and the Boys Project Group will commence next week.

Casey Bucksherim and Keegan Dodd joined us late last year as Aboriginal Education Workers. Casey and Keegan will be working with our Indigenous students in the classroom and assisting them with assessment tasks. They will also be coordinating cultural activities for the Boys and Girls Groups.

It hasn't taken very long for students to be involved in extra curricular activities with the College swimming carnival having already been held and lunchtime dance activities occuring. Coaches are also collecting names for several sports in preparation for upcoming tournaments. I look forward to hearing, reading and hoping to see many of our students participating and achieving success in these extra curricular activities.

CAREERS ADVISER

Hello and welcome 2018.

My name is Pauline Webber and I am the Careers Adviser based at Tuncurry Campus. This is a role you probably don't hear much about until a program or other event brings your child to me. I thought I might give you a short run down on what I do.

Research has shown time and time again that individual career planning with students is the most effective way career guidance can be offered. As a result every student in Years 9 and 10 are interviewed by myself. These interviews are not necessarily based around planning out an entire future for your child, after all, in this age of technology jobs are disappearing and new ones are being created every day. These interviews are very much focused on steering students in the direction of gaining as many employment related skills as possible. This means experiential learning is one of the most effective ways we have for enhancing your child's career development. Work-experience is strongly encouraged for those in Year 10, while the benefits of belonging to local community groups, sporting clubs, rescue organisations, gaining first aid skills can't be underplayed. Where possible I arrange excursions all designed around a "hands- on" approach to a vocation. All the while encouraging students to use their skills of communication and research to make sure they get the most out of the experiences. I base the activities I arrange by and large on where the students tell me their interests lie.

Coming up we have three such experiences arranged. "Meet a keeper" at Taronga Zoo, "Women in trades", Health forum in Taree. All of these activities are hands-on and students will get a realistic view of what jobs in these areas will entail, and therefore what skills they need to be developing for a career in these areas.

I arrange work-experience. More information can be found about that by visiting our lovely careers website <u>glctuncurrycampuscareers.com</u>. Here you will find newsletters and our work-experience handbook. Year 10 will be bringing their handbook home shortly and they are able to begin organising their work-experience by working with me. Please have a look at the handbook.

Remember, to a degree, it doesn't really matter what they do for work-experience as long as by doing it they are adding to their skill set. New experiences, new challenges, new skills.

I teach Year 10 one period a fortnight. I talk explicitly about quality resumes and it is an expectation that by the end of Year 10 each student will have a quality portfolio including a quality resume. Their portfolio should also hold important documents such as birth certificate, TFN, USI, references including work-experience report, school reports and career investigation information.

I arrange workshops and talks for the students as well as First Aid courses and Whitecard courses according to need.

I also am in charge of the alternative programs that students have access to in the school. These include Links For Learning, TAFE courses, Short one day courses, School based apprenticeship co-ordination and any other opportunities that arise for our students. I also work closely with Year 10 in choosing their subjects for Year 11.

I am available at the school Mon-Thurs each week. I am available for appointments and phone calls. If you would like to know more please don't hesitate to contact me and if you would like regular updates please like our facebook page. Tuncurrycampuscareers. Hoping you all have an enjoyable 2018.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Individual and group HSC results indicate 2017 was yet another excellent year for Great Lakes College Senior Campus.

Congratulations to Billy Newman who is the 2017 DUX of the Senior Campus. With Band 6's in Advanced English, Chemistry, Physics, Spanish Beginners and E3's in Extension 1 Mathematics and Extension 2 Mathematics, Billy was awarded an outstanding ATAR of 98.45.

At the commencement of each year we recognise the achievements of those students who excel in the HSC by achieving ATAR's in excess of 90. ATAR's of this calibre are an outstanding result and this year we congratulate Billy Newman, Petra Flower, Mia Gottstein, Ben Crowther, Rhys Thomas, Josh Dilger and Ehlayna Walters.

In 2017 students obtained Band 6's, (or equivalent Extension results), in the following subjects:- Biology, Chemistry, Community & Family Studies, Drama, Advanced English, PDHPE, Physics, Senior Science, Society & Culture, Textiles & Design, Visual Arts & Spanish Beginners.

Several of our HSC subjects have a mandatory Major Works component that makes up part of the students final mark. Each year NESA chooses the top works from across NSW and exhibits them. In 2017, Petra Flower's Dance performances, (both Core and Major Study) were included in *Callback*, her Visual Arts project was included in *ARTEXPRESS* and her Drama project was included in *OnStage*. Tully Church's major project for Textiles was also included in the *Texstyle* exhibition.

In 2016, Great Lakes College Senior Campus participated in a mandatory Department of Education, (DoE), "External Validation" inspection. One of the measures by which the DoE uses to determine whether a school excels is the number of students within the school who achieve at least two results in the Band 5 and 6 category. In the 2017 HSC, the Senior Campus had forty five students achieving this excellent level.

Such strong results by so many students is a reflection of not only the abilities of our students, their dedication and application, but also the excellent teaching they have received. In acknowledging my teaching staff for the excellent job that they have done, I would also like to acknowledge the teachers across the Great Lakes Learning Community and especially within our College. Our excellent HSC results are a consequence of 13 years of quality education. We are very lucky to belong to such a strong College & Community of Schools.

HSC success comes in many forms. For some it is high academic achievement, for others it is the combination of school based study and Vocational Education delivered from the school or by TAFE. For other students success is completing 13 years of schooling and obtaining a HSC.

Of our 205 Year 12 Graduates in 2017, we had 63 students who included 1 or more Vocational Education & Training Courses delivered by the school in their HSC. These courses included Construction, Hospitality, Metals & Engineering, Furnishing, Skills for Work & Vocational Pathways. These students received a full Certificate II or a Statement of Attainment toward CII on top of the HSC qualification.

A further 57 students attained a full Certificate II or a Statement of Attainment toward CII in a course delivered by TAFE and the students were able to include these courses as part of their HSC.

Courses studied by Senior Campus students at TAFE in 2017 included; Tourism, Automotive, Business Services, Construction, Electro-Technology, Human Services, Retail, Animal Studies, Flight Operations, Beauty Therapy, Children's Services, Property Services, Equine Studies and Hairdressing. Two students included a School Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship in Vocational Education Courses (Construction and Electrotechnology) as part of their HSC that incorporated paid part-time work, training and school.

Great Lakes College Senior Campus offers students a comprehensive range of curriculum and choice of different pathways.


